
What is Creative Learning Haven?

Creative Learning Haven (CLH) is a project to create and run community libraries in Imvepi and Rhino refugee settlements, Uganda. These are additional learning spaces that are the first of their kind in the camps.

Our shared mission: Encourage reading and independent learning for all.

How we do it: Open reading, free book borrowing, and activities specifically created for the community's needs (income-generation, literacy, creative expression).

The first two CLH branches have been started by two registered refugee-led organizations and Luyao (Lulu) Tian:



CLH are the only community libraries to primarily operate from a fixed location.

About Imvepi, Rhino, South Sudan, Uganda, and being a "refugee"

"Refugee" is a word that everyone has a different relationship with.

Most refugees have lived in Imvepi and Rhino for at least 8 years now, primarily related to conflicts in South Sudan and the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC). People from these countries have a history of forced migration to Uganda going as far back as 1962 (Uganda's independence).

95%

of CLH visitors are South Sudanese Imvepi stats: (2021)

Refugee population: 70,000+

- 82% women and children
- 98% from South Sudan
- 57% of youth out-of-school
- 68.1% without occupation

Rhino stats: (2021)

Refugee population: 124,000+

- 81% women and children
- 97% from South Sudan
- 70.6% without occupation

A bit about South Sudan:

South Sudan is the world's newest country, gaining independence in 2011. The nation is home to 64 ethnic tribes. Some of the tribes represented within CLH family include: Kakua, Nuer, Pojulu, Bari, Kuku, Mundu, Keliko, Dinka.

A bit about Uganda:

The tribe of Ugandans in the West Nile area is Lugbara. They are also called "host" or "nationals"


CLH is more than a place with books

Because libraries are still a new concept, we do not let books just sit on shelves.

We believe in proactively creating a culture of reading and creativity.

Peter explains the book organization system to Imvepi Secondary School students

When you enter CLH, our library team explains the book categorization system, recommends books, and introduces new activities.



We use an adapted version of the Dewey Decimal system, based on the African Library Project Manual (2014)

What we've learned:

- No nearby schools or organizations have a clear book categorization system.
- Fiction vs. Non-Fiction: Most people cannot identify the difference.
- Teacher and funding cuts in all schools mean students lack support.
- Costly school fees lead to drop outs before completing secondary school.
- Literacy and English are challenges especially for primary students and women.

Why CLH is unique

- CLH is the only place in the settlements where books are organized systematically.
- Visitors feel welcome because staff are from local refugee and host communities, speak local languages, and act as brothers and sisters.
- We run creative and literacy activities based on community needs.
- We empower local talent to lead activities: 6 part-time volunteers.
- We train staff with advanced project management and librarian skills:
 - Book management and categorization
 - o Google Drive, online research, Canva, Adobe Premiere Pro
 - Note-taking and proposal writing
 - Budgeting and finance



A new reading culture is emerging.

Currently, students are on school break in Imvepi and Rhino. Most families are farming and working to bring something extra home. **This is how things usually are.**

But these days, right when CLH opens, we have primary and secondary students waiting at our door, ready to read. **This is something new.**

- Support schools and people out of school with an additional learning space




Knowledge is power.

Executive Summary


- 1. Highlights: January April 2025
 - Started 2 community libraries
 - >1500 books transported
 - Served 353 unique individuals in April 2025
 - Trained 8 full-time staff from local refugee and national communities
 - 7 weekly activities
 - · 4+ weeks of filmmaking workshops
 - · Supporting students in low-resource schools and out-of-school populations
 - Efficient, community-centered implementation (total spending <\$8000)
- 2. Vision: Increased access to learning and creativity will change the futures of our nations (primarily South Sudan and Uganda).
- 3. What's Next: Fundraising, Partnerships, Expanded Impact

CLH is effective because our teamwork and community relationships are genuine. We eliminate unnecessary overheads and focus on community needs. We have accomplished a lot on a tight budget, and we know we can do much more with increased support. Next steps include mobile libraries for remote areas, literacy classes for women, and more income-generating activities.
